
## The Statute of Westminster (1931)

### Canada's legislative independence

REMEMBER! Canada's unwritten constitution includes the idea of **Responsible Government**, which means that <u>The King must follow the advice of his elected ministers (i.e. the prime minister)</u>.

\*There are a few instances where The King can act without advice (i.e. appointing a prime minister), but this is very rare.

#### Prior to 1931 ...




This is why when
Britain declared war
in 1914 the entire
empire (including
Canada) was
automatically at war.

As prime minister of the United Kingdom, I have the right to **ADVISE** the British Crown to declare war on behalf of Canada and the rest of the empire.

# Another way to think of it . . .

I am King George V. Before the Statute of Westminster (1931) I was King of the United Kingdom (Emperor of India) only. One person, one Crown.

After the Statute of
Westminster I also became,
separately, King of Canada,
Newfoundland, Australia, New
Zealand, South Africa, and the
Irish Free State (who were now
able to legislate for themselves
without British interference).
One person, seven Crowns!!
