## "Nation Building and History" Seminar

How is history used to build a sense of nationhood? In 2017 the Canadian Government was commemorating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Confederation – a celebration branded as Canada150. Produced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC), *Canada: The Story of Us*, was a series of 10 episodes that aired throughout the year.

Writing for the *Globe and Mail*, John Doyle wrote "For history buffs, it's a massive waste of time. For anyone else, it's just plain boring."

Doyle went on to say:

"The Story of Us is not meant to be a comprehensive and linear account of Canada's history nor a definitive history of Canada," CBC spokesman Chuck Thompson explained, while noting that about 75 real historians were consulted on the project. "It's a docudrama that highlights the often untold stories of just a few of the extraordinary people and events that helped shape our nation."

As a class, we are going to watch **Episode Three: War of Independence (1812 - 1813)** and then have a university-seminar to explore its value to our study of Canada.

Some questions:

- 1. What is the purpose of such a series? What does it tell us about Canada in 2017?
- 2. What do you notice about the language used in the episode? What do you think was the purpose of such language being used?
- 3. Do you think this episode was effective? What did you like? What didn't you like?
- 4. Anything else you found interesting.
