

# Describing your most important relationship

How would you describe your most important relationship? This activity asks you to do the following:

- Select one of the most important relationships to you, right now.
- Figure out a way to capture and define that relationship so that it can be explained/described and passed on to the class (or privately to the teacher).

You may use any medium, or any combinations of different medium, in order to capture, describe and passed on your selected relationship. Examples:

- Text
- Song/music
- Objects
- Paint
- Music
- Photograph
- A story
- Note
- Map
- Mind map
- Food
- A memory
- Anything . . .

Overall Expectations addressed in this activity<sup>1</sup>:

Expectations:

	Learning
Why are we doing this? (what's the point)	Student demonstrates their understanding that relationships are highly complex, naturally abstract things that are difficult to define as a static thing. Issues such as their own language, culture, and identity come into play when trying to describe/define a relationship.
