

PREFERRED INCOME INEQUALITY ESTIMATES FOR EUROPEAN RUSSIA, C. 1904

The Czar's sister, **Grand Duchess Olga Alexandrovna of Russia**, fled the violence of the Russian Revolution with her husband Nikolai Kulikovsky. From 1948-1952 they lived north of Campbellville at 10715 Guelph Line (30 minutes away in Halton). The couple eventually moved to 2130 Camilla Road in Mississauga where Nikolai died in 1958. In poor health, Olga moved into a friend's apartment at 716 Gerrard St E in Toronto. She died at the age of 78 in Toronto on November 24th, 1960, and is buried in Section 15, Lot 254 at York Cemetery.
