
Waterdown Reinvented as a Suburb



- Regular train service to the Village ends in 1950 when trains no longer stop at the Waterdown Train Station (which formally closes in 1962 and burns to the ground in 1966).¹
- However the ascendance of the automobile in Canadian life (the first vehicle arrived in Waterdown during the mid-1920s) would transform the village following the Second World War.
 - The Queen Elizabeth Way is opened on June 7th by King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (the highway's namesake) during the historic Royal Tour of 1939.

- Highway 403 (the highway that Waterdown Road connects with) is begun in 1960, with the portion connecting Highway Six to the QEW opening December 4, 1963.²
- In a few short decades Waterdown was completely transformed into a suburban hub as more and more surveys were added to every nook and cranny of the village. The common sight of open fields within the village boundaries vanished by the turn of the century.

Waterdown Suburban Development Timeline:3

1945 - Waterdown Heights (Wellington Street & Churchill Street)

1949 - Memorial Park is dedicated on August 18th

1951 – St. Thomas the Apostle Creed Catholic School is opened on Barton Street⁴

1952 – Highway Six is widened to accommodate more traffic

1952 - Hawksview Gardens Subdivision Registered (Howard Blvd & Orchard Drive)

1954 - Waterdown Gardens Survey Registered (James Street & Margaret Street)

1954 – Waterdown Public School on Mill Street is renamed *Mary Hopkins Public School*

1958 - Margaret Gardens Survey Registered (north James Street)

1958 – Aldershot is annexed by the City of Burlington

1959 - *Clappison Drive-In* opens on Parkside Drive, accommodating 930 cars⁵

1962 - Berry Hill Court Registered

1964 - Village Plaza (Hamilton Street - east side)

1964 - *Guy B. Brown Public School* is opened on Braeheid Avenue

1967 - Sewers installed in the village


1968 - First apartment building (*Waterdown Towers*, 100 John Street West) built on John Street (overlooking Memorial Park). Other apartment buildings will be built in 1972 (50 John Street West) and 1973 (75 John Street West)

1970 - Glenlea Survey Registered (Nancy Crescent)

1971 - Edith Court Registered

1971 - Braeburn apartment building built

1974 – The Village of Waterdown is amalgamated with the Townships of East Flamborough, West Flamborough and Beverly to become the Township of Flamborough.

1975 - Buchan Court Survey Registered

1977 - Waterdown Standpipe constructed on Main Street North (replacing original water tower built in 1928)

1981 - Renwood Park Survey Registered (Flanders Drive)

1985 – The Township of Flamborough becomes the Town of Flamborough.

1988 - Waterdown Shopping Centre built at 255 Dundas St E

1993 – Newest campus of Waterdown District High School is opened at 215 Parkside Drive

1994 – The Flamborough Santa Claus Parade is begun by resident Mary Lamb

1990s – Dundas Street is widened to accommodate the increase in traffic

2000 - Fortinos Plaza built at 115 Hamilton St N

2000 – Joe Sams Leisure Park is established

2000 - Allan A. Greenleaf Public School is opened on the WDHS Campus

2001 – Flamborough is annexed into the new City of Hamilton

2004 - Guardian Angels Catholic Elementary School is opened on Parkside Drive

2009 – Walmart opens in Waterdown

2011 - Residents declare a distinct Flamborough Coat of Arms and Flag⁶

2014 - Souharissen Natural Area is dedicated

2018 – Hamilton's Ward 15 (the one you are in now) remains as the only, distinctly "Flamborough" political jurisdiction after Hamilton changes its ward boundaries.
